Open Meeting Minutes
June 18, 2025
Approved July 31, 2025

The Northwest Missouri State University Board of Regents met at 1:00 p.m. on June 18, 2025, in the Goppert Foundation Classroom at the Agricultural Learning Center, 22893 US Highway 71, Maryville, Missouri, under public notice given June 10, 2025.

The following members of the Board were present: Steve Black, Steve Coppinger, Shanda Durbin, Jason Klindt, John Moore, Debbie Roach, Roxanna Swaney and Mel Tjeerdsma who participated via Zoom. - **Dr. Rob Voss, Faculty Senate President**

On behalf of the 51st Faculty Senate, I want to express my sincere appreciation for your continued support of shared governance and academic excellence. Your commitment makes it possible for faculty to thrive as educators, scholars, and university stewards.

It has been a privilege to serve this past year alongside an engaged and thoughtful group of faculty colleagues. I want to thank those faculty who participated in committee work, reviewed curriculum, heard appeals, and mentored both students and peers. Their work—much of it behind the scenes—is essential to the integrity and vitality of this institution.

This year, Faculty Senate met regularly and maintained a consistent presence in academic decision-making. Senators actively contributed through standing committees, subcommittees, and ad hoc efforts that kept the

wheels of governance turning and policies evolving in step with institutional needs.

Northwest faculty also continued to distinguish themselves in research across a wide range of disciplines, producing work that holds tremendous promise for the future. I would like to highlight some of the work that is being done on the research side.

In the School of Business, faculty are pursuing studies in rural economic development, workforce analytics, and organizational leadership—research that supports regional growth and positions Northwest as a key contributor to economic sustainability in the region.

In Agricultural Sciences, research has centered on sustainable practices, crop and soil science, and agri-tech innovations. These projects align with regional needs and create opportunities for student involvement, industry collaboration, and expanded funding for applied research in food systems and environmental health.

Faculty in the Natural Sciences are advancing work in conservation biology, environmental monitoring, and mathematical modeling—projects that often include student researchers and connect classroom learning to real-world problem-solving.

In the humanities and social sciences, faculty are engaging in digital history, archival storytelling, and studies of public memory and justice—work that centers our region’s narratives and connects local history to national conversations.

Faculty in Education are focused on instructional innovation, teacher development, and the impact of diversity and inclusion practices on student success. And across disciplines, faculty are contributing to national conversations on artificial intelligence, exploring its ethical, pedagogical, and institutional implications.

Amid this intellectual productivity, the Faculty Senate also navigated a series of challenges—many of which reflect broader pressures in higher education. We worked through curriculum redesigns, proposed course consolidations, and ongoing adjustments to academic offerings in response to enrollment patterns and budget realities.

Faculty were asked to do more with less—teaching, mentoring, advising, and adapting—all while sustaining high-impact learning experiences. And yet, through dialogue and collaboration, Senate helped facilitate change while safeguarding the academic standards and mission of the institution.

There were difficult conversations about program viability, faculty workload, and how to align strategic goals with limited resources. But there was also resilience, creativity, and a deep sense of shared purpose. The Faculty Senate served as a space where concerns could be aired, solutions proposed, and faculty voices meaningfully heard.

We also remain mindful of continuing concerns around compensation—particularly as they relate to extra-duty work such as summer teaching and overloads. While recognizing the financial constraints facing the institution, we look forward to continuing conversations about how we can ensure equitable and transparent support for faculty labor moving forward.

As we conclude the work of the 51st Faculty Senate, I’m proud of what we’ve accomplished and confident in what lies ahead. The incoming 52nd Senate brings new energy, diverse perspectives, and a strong commitment to shared governance.

Once again, thank you to the Board for your partnership, your presence, and your willingness to engage with faculty as co-creators of the academic future of Northwest Missouri State University. It has been an honor to

serve, and I look forward to the work still to come.
