
Active Learning through Community Connections

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Pedagogy Definitions

Active Learning-generally defined as any instructional method that engages students in the learning process. Active learning requires students to do meaningful learning activities and think about what they are doing (Bonwell, 2010 & Eison, 2010

Profession Based Learning- Real-life, hands-on, problem-solving experiences that can be done through case studies with external and internal audiences, peer-to-peer learning, practicums or field experiences. <u>https://www.nwmissouri.edu/career/profession-based-learning.htm</u>



- Project and data collected presented at National A ssociation for Education of Young C hildren in 2017




Active Learning

- -G ame has been used in T he Family classroom and in the H orace M ann L aboratory S chool.








Service Learning Profession Based Learning Active Learning
