



Northwest Core Requirements (General Education Requirements)

Important Notes:

- This guide should be used in conjunction with **advisement** from Metropolitan Community College (Omaha) and Northwest in preparation for transfer to Northwest.
- **Direct equivalencies are listed side by side.** Courses listed under “**other options**” do not have a direct equivalent from MCC-Omaha to Northwest, but may still be used to satisfy the Northwest Core requirement if the student’s major doesn’t have a directed Northwest Core requirement in that category.
- An **Associate of Arts** degree may be able to waive some CORE requirements at Northwest. Seek advisement for proper course selection. **Digital Literacy, Global Experiences, and any directed Northwest Core courses for specific majors cannot be waived by a prior A.A. degree.**
- MCC-Omaha courses marked with (*) are listed under two different CORE categories. They may transfer to satisfy **only one** of Northwest’s CORE areas, not both.
- MCC-Omaha operates on a quarter-hour system. Upon transfer to Northwest, quarter hours will be converted to semester hours as follows:

- As new catalogs come into effect, degree requirements may change. All students are accepted under the catalog effective upon entry to Northwest. Transfer students are eligible to return to the catalog of initial enrollment at the transfer institution, given the student has been continuously enrolled and has not sat out more than 18 months. Seek advisement for proper catalog selection.
- Submit the **transfer student application** for **free** online at www.nwmissouri.edu/admissions/apply/index.htm. Make sure to have all official transcripts sent to the Office of Admissions from all colleges attended, including dual credit.
 - **Transfer student admission requirements:**
 - Minimum cumulative transfer GPA of 2.00 from all transfer institutions (including dual credit)
 - Minimum of 24 transferable credit hours
 - Must be in good standing at prior college
