# SAFETY CORNER

### Stay Safe While Taking a Winter Walk

Winter walks can be beautiful and calming and good for you. Studies show that walking outside in the cool air can reduce inflammation and increase fat burn as well as improve your brain function. However, walking outside in the winter can also have hazards, such as ice and cold.

**Before you venture out,** take a look at these tips designed to keep you safe:

- Bundle up in layers. Don't risk hypothermia

   you can always take off layers if you get
  too warm.
- Protect your extremities. Wear hats, gloves and warm boots with rubber soles and non-slip treads.
- Assume wet or dark pavement is icy pavement and avoid it, if possible. If you must walk on ice, take slow, short steps or shuffle slowly and keep your arms at your side for balance.



## **SUSTAINABILITY**

#### The Five R's of Reducing Waste

For many people, recycling is the first waste reduction strategy that comes to mind, but it should be the *last* resort. Following the five-step hierarchy below can help organizations and households become more sustainable in the purchase and use of supplies and equipment. Let's examine the five R's of reducing waste.

1. <u>**REFUSE**</u> to buy wasteful or non-recyclable materials, including products that have excess packaging. This results in the production of fewer wasteful items.

- 2. <u>**REDUCE**</u> the use of wasteful, harmful, or non-recyclable items that are used.
- 3. <u>**REUSE**</u> items (including selling or donating) whenever possible instead of buying new ones. Strive to eliminate single-use items.
- 4. <u>REPURPOSE</u> or find new uses for items that cannot be refused, reduced, or reused. This is sometimes called "upcycling". <u>RECYCLE</u> items when the first four R's are not an option. Don't forget Northwest recycles paper, cardboard, aluminum cans, metal food cans, #1 and #2 plastic, and glass.
